#### **Supply List for Quiltworx Class**

- Pattern purchase from instructor
- Fabric separate information coming on quantity and preparation for workshop.
  DO NOT starch your fabric.
- Add-a-quarter ruler 12"



- Fabric glue <u>pen</u> and refills \*\* (Sewline, Quilter's Select, Bohin, Fons & Porter, etc). The pen and the refills can be different brands – the refills will fit any glue pen
- New blade in your rotary cutter\*\*
- 70/10 needle for sewing machine
- One Gallon Ziploc bags (to organize papers and fabric)
- Box of large paper clips (100 count) (not binder clips or project clips) (office supply)

• Scotch tape (Scotch brand preferred)



Basic sewing supplies – machine, scissors, seam ripper, thread, pins

#### **Available from instructor for purchase:**

- Template plastic 3" x 12" or 3" x 18" (used as a folding template)
- Scotch restickable glue stick (used for positioning fabric to the foundation paper) I do not recommend any other brand I have observed the brands leaving residue on the fabric. Available at office supply stores or Amazon or from instructor.
- Acorn Precision Piecing Products Easy Press Pen and Solution (highly recommended) \*\*

## **Philanthropy**

#### **Comfort Quilts:**

Thank you to everyone who has been making comfort quilts to donate. The gifts of your time, talent and materials are appreciated. Fabric was purchased by the Guild for comfort quilts. This fabric is available during our meetings. We are asking you to sign-out this fabric because it was purchased and not donated. We hope to have a Day Bee for making comfort quilts soon.

Donated batting and fabric are always appreciated! All styles of fabric are used in comfort quilts. Remember that scraps from the fabric used for surgical caps may be cut into squares or strips for use in comfort quilts. There are many plastic bags of fabric squares available at our guild meetings. Please feel free to take these to make comfort quilts.

A comfort quilt is whatever size you want to make it. Most comfort quilts we receive are lap size, approximately 50" x 65". We also get smaller quilts for young children which are about 45" x 60". We have labels for the quilts. They are available at the comfort quilt table during our guild meetings. Please contact Lisa Holbrook (holbrooklh@att.net) for questions about comfort quilts.

#### **Honor Their Service Quilts**

Keowee Key has changed the format of their Honor Their Service program but they still give each participant a quilt. Pat Fargis is the contact person for these quilts. **Quilts need to be at least 60" x 72". They can be patriotic colors or not.** Consider making one for next year's participants. These may be given to Pat at a guild meeting. *Email Pat Fargis at farpmoose@gmail.com* if you have any questions.

#### **Children's Scrub Hats**

Greenville Memorial Hospital gives every child having surgery a "Dollar Store" toy and a scrub hat prior to surgery. Some surgical hats are also donated to Oconee Memorial Hospital. They appreciate scrub hats with kid-themed fabric. These hats are not necessarily worn into surgery (they can be). But the kids get to take them home. They love picking them out when there is fun fabric!

You can donate fun child friendly fabric for surgical caps: 1 yard makes 5 surgical caps. We take donations of yardage, cut 18" or 16" circles, caps with sewn casings for elastic, OR completed caps with knotted elastic (this allows surgical staff to adjust the size to fit child).

Novelty fabrics and bright florals make great surgical caps. Please contact Patty Smith (413-531-9275) if you have questions about the surgical hats.

#### **WAYS TO HELP**

Donate kid-themed fabric (fat quarter,  $\frac{1}{2}$  yard, or a yard) for others to make scrub hats Make completed scrub hats with elastic

Cut out & sew casing hem on 16-18" circles for others to thread elastic through Thread elastic through the casing hem on the hats

#### **Directions for 5 scrub hats**

**You will need:** 1 yd cotton fabric

1/4 inch elastic 26" piece per hat

Thread

16 to 18 inch circle pattern (depending on fabric width)

Fold Fabric lengthwise so that an 8- or 9-inch single layer extends beyond the 2-layer folded. Fold width-wise. You will have 4 thicknesses in main part.

Cut four circles at one time.

With remaining single layer of fabric – cut two half-circles with a 1/41 seam allowance which can be sewn together to make one more circle for a surgical cap.

This gives you 5 hats. Remember that scraps from the fabric used for surgical caps may be cut into squares or strips for use in comfort quilts.

Finish off edge: Fold under  $\frac{1}{2}$ " and sew with zig-zag or other edging stitch to make casing for elastic. Or fold under twice and sew with a straight stitch to make casing.

Other suggestions for sewing the elastic casing:

- -Lengthening the stitch on that hem really speeds that part up.
- -If you serge the edges, using the differential feed to slightly gather/ease the edge makes turning the hem easy. NO pressing, NO tucks.

Thread a 26" piece of 1/4" elastic into casing. Tie off elastic with a simple loop knot leaving a large (1 to 3 inch) extra. This allows the nurses to easily adjust the hats according to the child's head size. [If you just want to sew hats & not put the elastic in them, we have volunteers who will do the elastic part.]

There is a small need for hats with 19" or 20" diameters. However, the 18" size can usually be adjusted to fit most kids.
